Dear Housing Committee,


I am a pediatrician who works in New Haven, CT and Chair of the Advocacy Committee for the CT Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics. These are my personal views and do not reflect those of my employer.

I am writing to **support SB 4** with the following amendments:

- 2.5% annual cap
- Cap the rent yearly regardless of whether a new tenant takes over a unit
- Expand good cause eviction protections

<u>The American Academy of Pediatrics</u> has published a policy statement outlining the many negative health outcomes children face as a result of housing insecurity or homelessness.

Children who are housing insecure are <u>2.5 times more likely</u> to have health problems and <u>3 times more likely</u> to have severe health problems when compared to children who are not homeless. Specifically, they are also at increased risk of multiple infectious such as ear infections, asthma, malnutrition, obesity, injuries and accidents, poorer school performance (image below), and speech and language deficits.



Therefore, it is critical that CT elected officials support SB 4 with the amendments outlined above in order to ensure that children in CT can have a safe and stable place to live.
